INTERVAL

Presentation on CRIME PREVENTION by Greenwich Police. followed by A Question and Answer Forum.

CLLR. ERNEST DYER (Cllr. Mottingham Ward)

The London Borough of Bromley is the biggest in area of all the London Boroughs. This presents considerable difficulties for our officers in monitoring the state of pavements, streetlights, and the general condition of our local environment. To help overcome this problem, without incurring the cost to council tax-payers of employing dozens of monitoring officers, we have a complaints procedure whereby residents can raise any matter regarding their local services that concerns them. If you go into any library there are postage pre-paid 'green cards' which can be used to indicate the nature of the problem and sent into the Council. These 'green cards' are intended to apply to environmental matters such as cracked pavements, damaged trees, poor maintenance of community land, and similar. More generally, the council has a fairly comprehensive complaints procedure, indeed there is a sub-committee (Performance Review), with particular responsibility to consider the operation of the complaints procedure. You the residents should not accept a poor service in any area of the Council's work, at the very least you should be able to find out why a service is not as regular or as comprehensive as you would wish. I am not aiming to encourage frivolous complaints but I am urging anyone who is dissatisfied with a service, or who notices something damaged say 'street furniture', or similar, to use the green cards or write in to the relevant department and make your views known.

As in many other localities in Bromley the shopping centre of Mottingham village struggles to retain its small retail outlets. We have recently lost the Corn Chandlers shop next to the Porcupine, and others also are experiencing difficulties. In St. Paul's Cray the Boroughs officers are running a pilot project to see if there is any initiatives that the council could introduce which would give more support to small businesses. Cllr. Rob Yeldham has been involved with this project and with other measures to assist the shop-keepers in the Kimmeridge road area. Both Rob and I are expecting that over the coming year positive help can be identified which the Council could initiate, or co-ordinate, which would improve the viability of small businesses in the village area. But of course the most valuable help the small shops could have is for local people to

use them more often!

In May this year my second term of office as a Councillor for Mottingham comes to an end. I have gained a great deal and got to know many decent local people during the eight years I have served you. I am standing again in May as I should like to continue. I am sure that whoever wins the election and is elected to serve you, from whatever political party, will serve you all at least as well as I have tried to do. I take this opportunity to thank the Executive Committee of the Mottingham Residents Association for all the very useful support they have given to me over the last eight years.

ODDS AND PIECES

The Local Elections in May - if you have always voted at Dorset Road School this venue has changed, to allow easier access for disabled, to The Oddfellows Hall, Beaconsfield Road. (next to No.4).

Parking Restrictions have been altered: Single yellow lines are now in force according to the notice displayed at the particular site.

Double Yellow Lines now mean NO PARKING 24 HOURS A DAY.

ELTHAM COLLEGE DEVELOPMENTS

Readers of our Autumn 1997 issue of Mottingham News will be aware of the severe set back to the School's plans. In September last, Bromley's Development Control Committee refused planning consent for Phase 1 of the development which included additional car parking facilities, a new Music School and a new entrance/exit from Grove Park Road. Since that time, matters have progressed and the current position is as follows:

The school have recently lodged an appeal against the September refusal. Our understanding is that this appeal will take the form of a Formal Inquiry conducted by an Inspector from the Department of the Environment. Provisional

dates of 8/9 September 1998 have been allocated.

The Mottingham Residents Association intend to support Bromley in contesting the appeal and plan to present supporting evidence to the Inspector in due course.

It is very important for us, your Executive Committee, to be aware of the views of the Members of the Association in this matter. A simple Ballot Form was included with the Autumn 1997 issue of the Mottingham News. You are asked to complete this form (if you have not already done so) and return to your Road Representative as soon as possible.

On presenting M.R.A's objections to the Inquiry Inspector, we will then be required to prove our members support or objections to the applications, which can only be obtained from the returns of our questionnaires - they are therefore extremely important. If you have mislaid the form, your Road Steward can provide a copy.

The special sub-committee set up to handle the response of the Association to the proposed development and to co-ordinate actions with Bromley, has held its first meeting. Members of the Committee will welcome any suggestions/comments that residents may care to name.

In addition to completing the simple YES/NO ballot form, our members are also urged to write to the Inspector setting out their reasons for objecting/supporting the School's plans. Further details on this matter will be provided in due course.

One last point, attendance at the Enquiry in September by members, even for the odd hour or so, will demonstrate to the Inspector that Mottingham residents are responsible citizens who are interested and care for their environment.

POLICING AND CRIME

There have been a lot of changes in the organisation of our Police - Chislehurst Station no longer has a Sergeant or Inspector on the premises - they are now based at Bromley Station. Also the Eltham Station Inspector is now based at Greenwich Station. If you have a minor enquiry you can still contact either Chislehurst or Eltham, but ALWAYS dial 999 in an emergency.

The Police will no longer be responsible for supervising, placing cones or road closures for any Charity events. The Local Council will arrange this, but charges will be made, ranging from £100 to £1,000. We are not certain at this time, if Councils will charge for personal requests to place cones when a funeral

is taking place.

Thefts from garages and sheds is still top of the crime lists, especially now we need those mowers, strimmers etc. with, hopefully, a nice summer on the way. Have you made a record of the serial numbers of these, and all your electrical household goods (AND PROPERLY MARKED THEM). It's a bitter pill for the Police to swallow when they arrest someone with suspected stolen goods but without a record of serial numbers cannot charge the suspect.

The Metropolitan Police hold a computer data base of property it has recovered. If you could positively identify goods you have had stolen, call 0171-230 1970 - the service is completely free.

It is human nature to take our Policemen and Women for granted. We expect them to be there when we want them, and complain when they are not, but very few stop to think and they put their lives at risk every day. David Edgar (who has served on the M.R.A. Committee for many years) has had cause to know the heartbreak an entire family can suffer when an officer loses his or her life while on duty. On 13th February 1948 his brother Nathaniel (Nat) was shot and died of his wounds, leaving a wife and two young sons. On the 50th anniversary of Nat's death the Edgar family attended a commemorative service The Muswell Hill Police Station, when a plaque was unveiled in his memory, alongside that to PC Keith Blakelock.
