CAN YOU REMEMBER THE OLD SHOPS?

One of the main topics of conversation in Mottingham recently has been about the shops there used to be in the village and the wide range of things they sold. It wasn't so many years ago that Mottingham boasted a butchers, a bakers and no fewer than two greengrocers. There was also a grocery store where they cut butter from a slab and where you could have your bacon sliced to order on the counter in front of you. And there was a wet fish shop

It was the wet fish shop - and the death of Dennis Linscottthe man who ran it for many years which started the conversation about the "old days". Dennis was known affectionately as "Dennis the Fish" because for many years he and his wife Joan had run their shop - "West Park Fisheries"- at 55 Mottingham Road.

He took over the shop in 1953 from Joan's father and ran it for 28 years. Its specialty was smoked fish which Dennis used to smoke on the premises in a large kiln at the rear of the shop. People used to come from miles around to sample these local delicacies and a particular favourite was apparently bloaters. Unfortunately the shop closed down in 1981 but Dennis stayed on in the fish business and worked for 14 years at Harrods looking after their famous fish counter.



Situated where the Chinese take-away now is, the shop is still remembered clearly by many local people even though it closed down 26 years ago.

In honour of Dennis's memory and the "old Mottinghan" we thought we would take a look back and ask how many of these other old shops do residents remember:

Rogers Hardware (now the chemists)

Mottingham Home Stores (Indian restaurant)

Express Dairy (kebab shop)

Co-op Stores and Butcher, (Star supermarket, Court Road)

Mottingham Shoe Company (cleaning materials shop)

Brisley's Wine Store (nail shop)

Gays Tobacco and Toy shop (motorcycle shop) and

Swans grocers (dry cleaners)

There were also two greengrocers – one where the tyre repair shop is and the other where the carpet shop is. Can anyone remember their names?

FLORAL DISPLAYS

It was great to see some flowers outside the Mottingham Road shops this year.

A long campaign by the Residents Association saw four pyramids of geranium flowers appear on the pavement one morning – courtesy of Bromley Council – and remain there throughout the Summer. Not only did they provide a much needed splash of colour, but they also provided a talking point about what else could be done to brighten up the village.

One suggestion from local councillor Roger Charsley was a village sign – and discussions are now taking place as to the cost of a sign and where it might be situated.

A possible site is by the holly tree on the piece of land next to the Methodist church. It's right on the junction with Court Road and at the heart of the village. Anyone got any other suggestions?

PHILLIPS AND DEAR

Plans to convert the former Phillips and Dear electrical shop into a late night takeaway have been finally scuppered.

Almost a year after local councillors voted down the proposal, a Government Inspector has backed the decision and rejected an appeal by a company called Brentwood Investments on behalf of an unnamed client. The Inspector concluded a late night takeaway would create too much noise and disturbance and this would have an adverse effect on people living nearby.

The would-be owners had claimed there would be NO increase in noise and that a late night takeaway would add "vitality" to the area. The Inspector rejected these arguments saying there was likely to be considerable noise not just from cars but also from loud conversations between customers on the pavement outside.

Any benefits - she concluded - would be outweighed by the harm to the local community.

Her decision and the reasons behind it could prove vital in any future applications for takeaways in the village because she also ruled it was contrary to Greenwich's own development plan - something Greenwich's planners will presumably now take on board!

Thanks to everyone who wrote in and objected – and especially to those people who turned out to the appeal hearing which was held in Woolwich and at a time and on a day when many people couldn't make it because of work or other commitments.

Particular thanks also to the motorists who double parked outside the shop when the Inspector visited the area. Without realising it they helped our case enormously because one of the other main objections to the plan was the lack of parking facilities in the area and the fact that people using the shop would have the double park! Greenwich planning officials had originally claimed there was ample parking ...

PS. The identity of the firm involved remained a secret right to the end but rumours persist locally that it was Dominos Pizza.

RUBBISH COLLECTION - BIG CHANGES

Big changes are on the way to rubbish collections in the Greenwich part of Mottingham – but there is no need to worry that you'll be left with mounds of rotting rubbish as a result.

Unlike some of the councils reported in the media recently who switched to fortnightly collections and left local residents complaining about the smell from decaying garden and food waste, Greenwich is actually stepping up the number of collections.

Starting in January, blue top recycling bins will be emptied once a week instead of once a fortnight. At the same time a new black bag collection is being introduced once a fortnight for rubbish which can't be recycled. This includes polystyrene, tetra packs and waxed cartons

Green bins will continue to be emptied weekly as at present.

The aim is to try and dramatically increase the amount of rubbish being recycled in the Borough and the new service officially starts on Monday. January 21.

As well as extra home collections, Greenwich is also introducing more special recycling banks which will be colour coded.

Blue containers will take used household batteries and mobile phones.

Pink bins will be for small electrical items like hairdryers, irons, toasters and kettles.

Black bins for recycling waxed cartons are being trialled at five locations.

RUBBISH ON TV

One of the biggest moans from Bromley residents visiting the popular Waldo Road re-cycling centre is the long queues that build up-especially at weekends. Often the queues stretch back into Homesdale Road and cause severe traffic disruption.

Now Bromley council has come up with a novel idea to try and beat the problem.

They have installed two web cameras - one facing towards the centre and the other away from it. So before setting off on your journey, all you need do is pop onto the Bromley council web site to see what the traffic is like.

If the cameras show long queues, then just sit back and have another cup of tea and try later.

Special thanks to Ted Hedges – landlord of The Porcupine for allowing use of the car park and providing refreshments afterwards. Also to Sgt John Ward and the police Safer Neighbourhood Team who diverted traffic around the village so that the two minute silence at 11 o'clock was "silent".

SAFER NEIGHBOURHOOD PANEL

The Mottingham and Chislehurst North panel has now been in operation for two years, working closely with the Police SN team based in the new Police Office behind HSBC in Chislehurst. We meet every 6 weeks to discuss local community issues, police activities, initiatives and priorities. Reports are passed up to the Bromley Community Engagement Forum which is responsible for the Boroughwide strategic policing and the Safer Bromley Partnership.

The panel comprises people from a number of areas within our Ward and besides the police SN team and Councillors it includes representatives dealing with young people, the Learning shop, the Schools, St Edwards Church, and the MRA. Others would be very welcome, and if anyone is interested in joining the Panel please let me know.

In recent months the panel has discussed issues such as; the provision of additional facilities for young people, criminal activities in the area, prevalent motoring offences, under age drinking - including how and where alcohol is acquired, and particular issues that have arisen and required Police attention.

The number given is 0906 661 1911. The warning says the number is in fact in Belize and that people are being charged £15 a time if they ring it.

This was indeed the case in 2005 but the number was subsequently shut down by the mobile phone regulator ICSTIS. It physically no longer exists so the ICSTIS people are puzzled as to why the story is one again going the rounds on the internet.

His leaving do at Chislehurst British Legion was attended by the Bromley commander Chief Superintendent Charles Griggs which shows the respect senior officers had for Andy.

BP MAKEOVER

Good news - the BP garage in Mottingham has had a makeover and become a Marks and Spencer's outlet.

Bad news - the cash machine which has proved a boon to many local people has temporarily disappeared from inside the shop.

The garage has however applied for planning permission to re site it outside the garage by the night till so that it's available 24 hours a day.

The Residents Association are asking for assurances about the extra litter likely to be created by till receipts and the noise affecting the elderly residents of Evelyn Rogers Court which adjoins the garage.

PUB WATCH

Local pubs and restaurants are being asked to join together to clamp down on yobs who make life a misery for landlords and people who live near to pub premises.

It's the idea of Richard Eden who runs the Queens Head pub in Chislehurst next to the lower pond. He wants to set up a Pub Watch scheme in Chislehurst and Mottingham so that when yobs do cause trouble they are automatically barred from all the pubs in the area.

"At the moment" says Richard "they get barred from one pub and just go to the next one down the road and cause trouble there. With this scheme the word will go out and they won't be allowed into any licensed premises at all".

It's not just drunkenness which causes the problem, he says but general vandalism and rowdiness in and around pubs. Free travel on buses for under 16 year olds has made the problem much worse because youths come to the area from all over South London and are roaming the streets till the early hours.

Richard says he had a lot of support so far from local pubs and restaurants and also from the police Safer Neighbourhood team.

SUNDAY OPENING

Bromley council is to run an experiment with library opening on Sundays.

It's chosen the central library in the High Street for the trial which will run until the end of March next year. During that time the library will open its doors from 1pm to 5pm on every Sunday - apart from Christmas and New Year.

If the experiment is successful it may become permanent and be extended to other libraries in the Borough.

TO SPEED - OR NOT TO SPEED

A recent survey by Bromley council showed the vast majority of motorists using Mottingham Road kept within the 30 mph speed limit.

The survey was in response to complaints from local residents who felt the road was turning into a speed track resulting in several near misses on the pedestrian crossing by the Methodist church.

The survey was carried out on the stretch of road between the Prince of Wales pub and the junction with Court Road between July 26 and August 3 and showed 85% of vehicles were clocked at 30 mph or less.

That still means that 15% were driving over the limit and the Residents Association is keeping up the pressure on Bromley to erect warning signs asking drivers to slow down.
