## HANDS OFF OUR WAR MEMORIAL



A seemingly innocuous circular from Bromley Council about road works at the War Memorial in Mottingham contained a sting in the tail. The plan as outlined by the council was to widen the roundabout on which the Memorial is sited so as to slow down speeding traffic. So far, so good.

The plan was similar to the one carried out at the roundabout near Eltham College and local residents were asked for their views.

It took a former council architect and local resident to spot the flaw in the argument. The roundabout by Eltham College is plastered with blue Keep Left signs and black and white chevrons. Was this also going to happen to the War Memorial roundabout?

A request was duly sent to the exotically named "assistant sustainable transport officer" at Bromley asking whether this was indeed the case. There was no mention of signs in the circular but were they part of the plan?

No answer emerged and the deadline for consultation duly passed with the "sustainable transport officer" maintaining a sustained silence. At this point, the Residents Association made another request for an answer to the original question which had been posed three weeks earlier. The response was interesting.

The first answer from the "assistant" official said signs would be considered "at the construction stage". This was then quickly followed by another reply from her senior officer who said he would "take advice" from other officers to see if they could "maintain the current situation" i. e. leave things as they are.

Translated into simple English, this meant nobody could actually give any assurance that the War Memorial would not be plastered in traffic signs if the scheme went ahead.

The Residents Association therefore lodged a formal objection to the plan. Anyone who attends the Remembrance Day service at the Memorial will understand the appalling visual effect signs would have and the difficulties they would present to people laying wreaths on Remembrance Sunday – an event which is attended by a substantial number of local people each year. One resident claimed it would amount to "desecration".

**STOP PRESS**: As the magazine was literally going to the printers, Bromley council got in touch to say that although they had approved the plan, they would give a "categorical assurance" that no signs would be erected. Thanks to local councillors Roger Charsley and Charles Rideout for their support and for committee chairman Colin Smith who wrote to say he shared our views about the "sanctity" of the Memorial.

PS. It's a moot point as to whether the new style roundabouts actually work anyway. The evidence of the one by Eltham College is that if anything cars from Grove Park Road now go even faster into the junction than before because they think they have more space!



#### VILLAGE SIGN FUND LAUNCHED

Our campaign for a village sign for Mottinghham has been officially launched with a Target of £2,000 to be raised by next June. Opposite is a first draft of the design drawn up by Stewart Clark of Bromley's Urban Design department.

It's based on your response to the last MRA newsletter which was delivered to every household in the parish and contained illustrations of 20 different village signs in Bromley Borough.

Residents were asked to vote for their favourite and the most popular by far was the one for Biggin Hill. Stewart's design is based on that with the main features being Eltham College and its grounds and a cricket bat and ball representing the famous cricketer WG Grace who used to live in Mottingham Lane. The corn stalks in the bottom left are a reminder of the time when Mottingham was an agricultural area from which Court Farm Road and Chapel Farm Road got their names. The date on the top of the sign refers to the first known mention of Mottingham in AD 862.

The sign will be 3 ft x 2ft wide and have a painted metal finish. It will sit on a 10ft column and be sited at the junction of Court Road and Mottingham Road.

The unveiling is scheduled to take place at the start of the Mottingham Festival next June - with the ceremony possibly being performed by the Mayor of Bromley.

What we need to do now is to raise £2,000 towards the cost with Bromley Council promising to match that figure.

A special account has been set up for donations and there is a form enclosed with details of where to send your money – cheques only please. A list of donors will be published in the next newsletter and there is a section on the form for you to tick if you would like your name included.

# MOTTINGHAM MISSING WREATH MYSTERY

The annual Remembrance Day service in Mottingham this year was soured by the theft of one of the wreaths - and the local vicar and Chairman of the MRA being interviewed by the "hate crimes" unit of Bromley police.

The service itself - organised by Churches Together in Mottingham and conducted on the forecourt of The Porcupine by Rev Ian Welch from St Andrews church - was well attended as usual and many local organisations and individuals laid their wreaths on the memorial.

It appears however that one of the wreaths - from the British National Party (BNP) - was later removed and this lead to a complaint to Bromley police who designated it as a "hate crime".

The Chairman of the MRA and the Rev Welch were subsequently interviewed on the grounds they were involved in the organisation of the ceremony and may therefore know something about the alleged theft. Neither was able to throw any light on the incident and investigations continue.

#### TREE TROUBLE



Residents in the Greenwich part of Mottingham have been suffering double trouble with their trees this year.

In West Hallowes the problem is being caused by some new trees planted in the pavement by Greenwich council. Nicknamed "The Tree of Heaven" their official name is Ailianthus Altissima so called because they can reach a height of 30 metres. In some countries like the USA they are classed as an invasive species because of their habit of throwing up shoots several feet away from the base of the tree.

This is what has happened in West Hallowes with subsequent damage to the pavement and nearby walls and paths. Local residents have been complaining to the council and asking for trees to be removed.

Greenwich's street tree manager Bob Charlton says on reflection the trees were probably not the best choice for footway planting although he says there have been relatively few complaints about them. If residents are experiencing problems however, the council will remove the tree altogether and this is what will happen to some of the trees in West Hallowes this Winter.

Round the corner from West Hallowes the famous horse chestnuts of West Park have also been having a bad time of it this year.

They have been a shadow of their normal magnificent selves and it's because they have been hit by a triple whammy of – leaf miner moths, fungus and drought.

It's the leaf miner moth - cameroria ohridella - that is causing most of the damage. It lays its eggs on the leaves and its larvae are what causes the leaves to shrivel, turn brown and fall early. Although the trees look as if they are dying there is no evidence of this actually happening. The effect appears to be purely visual.

The moth was first observed in Macedonia in the late 70s and rapidly spread across Europe. The first sighting in England was in chestnut trees on Wimbledon Common in 2002 since when the South of England has borne the brunt of the invasion.

As if this wasn't enough, the trees are also being hit by a canker fungus and the effects of a dry Summer which has lessened their resistance to disease. The current fashion for turning front gardens into parking areas is also creating a problem because water can no longer soak into the ground and into their root systems.

#### BEWARE HELPFUL RUBBISH COLLECTORS

A word of warning if you are approached by someone offering to take away your rubbish - YOU could end up in court for fly tipping!

This is what happened to a local resident recently who had moved house and had packing cases and various other bits of household detritus piled at the front of the house awaiting disposal.

A "man with a van" knocked on the door and offered to take it away there and then rather than wait for the local council to come round and take it. Asked for an assurance he wouldn't just dump it on the nearest piece of waste land, he proceeded to produce an official looking certificate on a clip board which said he was a licensed waste remover. He assured the householder the rubbish would be disposed of at an officially recognised waste transfer station.

Imagine the householders surprise when three days later they received a letter from Kent County Council saying the rubbish had been found dumped in a lane in Kemsing and they could now face prosecution for fly tipping. The householder was traced because among the rubbish was an envelope with their name and former address.

When the circumstances were explained, the council dropped the threat of prosecution but the council's enforcement officer John Evans said householders should always insist on asking for a contractors Environment Agency licence number before agreeing to let them dispose of rubbish.

If you want to check the number is genuine you can ring the Environment Agency on 08708 506 506 and ask for "waste carrier validation".

PS. As with most things bureaucratic, this number seems to operate only during normal office hours from Monday to Friday. At weekends - when most of these fly tippers are at work - the Agency only has a recorded message service. Spot the gap?

#### WHEN IS A SHED NOT A SHED

Great consternation among residents living in Highcombe Close and West Hallowes about a structure that has appeared in the rear garden of a house in Highcombe Close.

Technically the structure is a shed but that said it's rather a large one being almost 12ft high. Because of the difference in height between the gardens in Highcombe Close and the gardens in West Hallowes it backs onto it - the height is exaggerated and the building dominates the skyline and the view from the houses in West Hallowes. It is also – to put it politely – no architectural gem.

Bromley council's enforcement team has looked at the building and ruled it doesn't contravene any planning rules - however large and intrusive. This is because it falls within what is known as "permitted development" i. e. not needing planning permission. In this case what this means is that so long as the building is more than 15ft away from the rear of the house, does not take up more than half the garden and is under 12ft high it is perfectly legal.

What the building cannot be used for however is for business purposes or living accommodation.
