There is not space to list the whole programme so here's a selection of the huge variety of events that were held throughout the two weeks :

- a Flower Festival which ran for 3 days in St Andrew's Church Hall,
- an historic walk around Mottingham which proved to be a huge success for the organiser, local historian John Kennett;
- story times and other activities for the younger residents;
- a well attended Gardener's Question Time at the Dorset Road Infant School, which kicked off with a quiz for the audience before they could quiz the panel!
- various music events including a concert by the Grove Park Singers accompanied by the Monday Afternoon Strings, another by the Leonore Ensemble, and a presentation by the founder and MD of Meridian Records (a CD company based in Eltham) and
- alternative Olympics at Fairy Hill Park
- open gardens and the Mottingham Horticultural Society's Summer show in the Maryfield Hall

The Festival proved to be the most successful ever, and was particularly well attended!

Mottingham Village Concert Band will be playing at the Christmas concert in the Maryfield Hall on 16 December, 8 pm. (Free admission, with a retiring collection) The Festival Community Trust will be holding its AGM on Tuesday 19 January 2010 at St Alban's Church Hall, 7.30 pm. There will be a filmed presentation of highlights of the 2009 Festival. All are welcome.

VILLAGE SIGN UNVEILED

The last newsletter carried the design chosen by residents for the proposed new Mottingham Village Sign and reported on the official launch of the fund-raising campaign.

That campaign proved remarkably successful, with generous donations by both residents and local businesses, so much so that the original target of \pounds 2000 was well exceeded and there were sufficient funds for not one but two signs!

The first sign is located as originally planned at the junction of Court Road and Mottingham Road. The second one has been placed on one of the traffic islands near the BP Garage, so anyone approaching Mottingham Village from either direction cannot fail to see one of the signs.

The fund-raising proved so successful, that a small surplus accumulated which will be invested in a Community Noticeboard (see item in this Newsletter)

MOTTINGHAM HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY CELEBRATES 50 YEARS

This year sees the 50th Anniversary of the Mottingham Horticultural Society (MHS) which was founded in 1959 and is still thriving in an era that has seen other Horticultural Societies disbanding due to lack of interest or support. A real benefit that the MHS offers its members is discounts on seeds and other gardening products at its Trading Shed in Gardener's Close.

In March 2009, a celebratory "Spring Show" was held before the AGM and proved so popular that it is now to become a regular yearly event joining Summer Show (June) in St Mary's Hall and Autumn Show (August b/h) in Eltham College. The Spring Show is held just before the MHS's AGM in the Oddfellows Hall: the 2010 event will be on 24 March and copies of the show schedule can be picked up at the Trading Shed

Horticulture is at the forefront of many peoples' lives, be that just a simple hanging basket or window box, or an allotment. The demand for space to grow your own food has never been greater with waiting lists for allotments expanding all the time.

As well as our older members, we also want to nurture the younger elements of our societies, so in its 50th year, the MHS wants to recruit more members of all ages so that it can continue for another 50 years. The MHS therefore extends a warm invitation to all residents to become members of this thriving community

DORSET ROAD SCHOOL

Jean Hiller, who succeeded Liz Keable, has just begun to enjoy her second year as Headteacher at Dorset Road Infant School and has given an update on the school's continued development and progress.

The School continues to cherish its place at the heart of Mottingham and the local community; and Jean and the staff are very grateful for the tremendous support they received from local traders that made their most recent fund raising efforts so successful. You may well have seen their country dancers on Foxes Field during Mottingham Festival.

The 'Lime Room', the modular building visible from Portland Road (what many of us call "The Beach Hut"!) has enabled the School to support the community as well as provide valuable teaching and learning space for the children. MRA and Safer Neighbourhood Panel meetings are held in there regularly as are Friday Toddler Groups. It also hosts some of the meetings for parents of children with disabilities. The Over Sixties continue to hold their keep fit class Fridays in the hall, as does a local adult Yoga group on Tuesdays. These classes are free.

Following the second intake of children into our Reception class in January 2009, the class will be full and there is now a waiting list. Year 1 and 2 classes have few places and the Scool should be almost to maximum numbers in January 2010, the highest for some years. There is an Open Day for prospective parents and pupils on 18th November, with three opportunities to be shown around the school and to ask questions during the day. If your child will be starting school in 2010 / 11, please do come and visit I, and see a happy, friendly school for yourselves.

NEW TRAFFIC ISLAND FOR MOTTINGHAM

Residents will be only too well aware of the number of accidents that have occurred at the junction of Leysdown Road and Mottingham Road. Not least, exiting Leysdown Road has been a problem for drivers as vehicles parking in Mottingham Road have impaired visibility

Following numerous complaints, the local Councillors took up the issue with Greenwich Council's Highways management. The upshot is that there is agreement to instal a traffic island in Mottingham Road between Leysdown Road and Clarence Road, plus some additional double yellow lines to ensure that the carriageway is kept clear around the island.

The installation work will take about three months to carry out. This should – it is hoped! - reduce the traffic risks and the accident rates at this particular spot in Mottingham

DEVELOPMENTS DURING THE PAST YEAR

Planning applications have often been a cause for concern and the Residents Association with considerable support from the local Councillors have taken these up with the relevant Councils: a couple of successes have been the refusal of the application for a pizza takeaway at the former Phillips & Dear, and the withdrawal of the developer to turn The Royal into what many felt would have been tantamount to a nightclub. And concerted action (with the police) within both the Greenwich and Bromley halves of Mottingham to deal with under-age drinking and anti-social behaviour.

A MESSAGE FROM THE SECRETARY

Your Residents Association is not only one of the oldest but also one of the largest in South London and credit for this is due to the wonderful support from our road stewards.

Sadly one of our long serving stewards, Martyn Hill, has succombed to ill health and has had to stand down. Our Chairman, Liz Keable, has offered to cover Leysdown Road, Hartsmead and Downleys Close for the time being but we urgently need volunteers to come forward, not only for these roads, but also anyone willing to put their name forward to lighten the work of stewards who cover more than one road, or perhaps share duties in large roads with the present steward/s.

LIBRARY FACILTIES

Everyone thinks of a library as a place that has a store of books for reference or borrowing. Traditionally, that was once the case but nowadays libraries are very different places and Mottingham Branch Library is no exception. It still has the books - and newspapers and magazines – but it also provides a great deal more:-

- there are computers for online access to the web for a wealth of information.
- additionally Computer Club is run on late Wednesday mornings for more 'mature' people, with a 6-week course focussing on word documents, email & a some internet use. However, that has proved so popular that there is a long waiting list! The Library can arrange one-to-one sessions at mutually convenient times for basic introductions to the internet and setting up e-mail accounts
- regular surgeries for the local Councillors (both Greenwich and Bromley)
- Wednesday coffee mornings with guest speakers on a wide range of subjects or backgrounds
- adult reading groups including two that meet on alternate Friday evenings
- a "Chatterbox" reading group for 8 to 10 year olds, and has recently started a teenage reading group
- and activities for under 2s, for 2-5 year olds in term times, plus half-hour Storytime sessions on Fridays and Saturdays

Bromley residents can also buy Bromley Council Garden Waste stickers, and Bromley Council food waste bags are also available.
